He was responsible for the first contests which were relatively small – around 15 people took part in each. But it has all changed and the last competition with such a small number of people took place in 2013. The following year I became the manager of the company, so in fact I was in charge of the contest, and began organising it right away. And yes, we were successful! Almost 50 people took part in 2014. Immediately after that I began organising the 2015 contest. And since then the number of people has grown to 300.'

The Hollensbury Spite House in Alexandria, Virginia

If you ever visit Alexandria, Virginia, don't miss the Old Town. It's a big attraction for visitors especially because of a local sightseeing hit: a famous house called the Hollensbury Spite House. The house was built in the 1830s and John Hollensbury built it on a narrow path in between his and his neighbour's house. People used to take a shortcut through that path and make a lot of noise, which really annoyed John. So, he decided to make those people angry by building a house and making it impossible for them to walk there. The house is 7 feet wide and it is considered the narrowest house in the USA. In fact, there is no smaller house in the USA. It was named Spite House because it was built to annoy others as well as three other old Spite Houses in Alexandria. They were built at different locations but in the same time period when John built his. The same method was used to build them all, which, of course, was different from modern building methods.

However, local people say that there are more possible explanations for the house's origin. One is that John's friend, who lived in the neighbouring house kept riding his horse carriages¹ through the narrow path in between their houses. The horse carriages often hit John's walls, damaging them. So, John decided to build the Spite House to stop that. That friend of his never spoke to him again because of what John did. Another explanation is that Hollensbury built the Spite house just to show that he could afford it. As he owned a factory that produced building materials, he could save a lot of money. Another possible explanation is that Hollensbury built the house as a playhouse for his two little children. And indeed, one of the first owner's daughters moved in there as a young woman later on.

After the Hollensbury family had died, the Hollensbury Spite House was used as a classroom for some time before it turned back into a family home. In 1990, businessman Jack Sammis bought the house for \$130,000. Local people worried he might want the house to serve as a location for his business. However, Sammis had no such plans for the former family home. Instead, Jack and his wife stay in the house during their weeks off in summer. They also love spending Thanksgiving there with their friends. Because of its historic value, Jack and his wife let schools bring their students to see the inside of the house for free during the year.

After buying the house, Jack Sammis made some changes to the inside of the house. Some of the original details were changed. For example, the brown wooden floors were painted light green. The rooms now look a bit bigger because of it. The heating and cooling system was moved to a small space under the roof and the water heater, which used to be in the kitchen, was moved to an upstairs wardrobe. Due to the original size of the front door, which Jack didn't want to give up, large furniture could not be brought in. That's why Jack had to buy smaller pieces of furniture from local antique stores.

Jack Sammis' wife loves the house. She says, 'When my friends come to visit us, they say it's so cosy! Like the best hotel room! I have a different opinion, but I'm glad they love it. When I enter, I imagine I am a little girl again, playing with my toys, little wooden babies, at their small home. Sometimes my husband suggests renting the house to movie companies. He wants to know what it feels like to be at a place where someone is making a movie. I disagree because I'm worried that the house would become too attractive for tourists. They would keep trying to see the inside, as if it were a museum. To me, however, the house feels just the opposite – so full of life. It's a great house!'
